Rib Lake Public Library and Tomahawk Public Library are the recipients of the 2019-2020 WVLS Innovation and Collaboration Literacy Grant.


Each library will completely change the design of an area within their library and collaborate on new and innovative ways of providing services. Possibilities include a mural from a local

WVLS is currently accepting applications for five scholarships.


