  20-40 seconds and takes readers step-by-step through different Libby actions like how to move

### 8. Update on WVLS Database Offerings (repeat)

WVLS recently completed a database review process to determine whether to renew all our EBSCO database offerings. These offerings include Hobbies and Crafts Reference Center, Home Improvement Reference Center, Small Engine Repair Reference Center, NoveList Plus, and NoveList Select. WVLS put together the Database Advisory Group, made up of member library staff. This fall, the Database Advisory Group will meet again to discuss Ancestry and Gale Courses.
