If you visit the Farmer's Market in Tomahawk this summer, chances are you will see a storytime happening.

"I was spending a lot of time in La Crosse several years ago, because my daughter was attending college there, and I was there for the WLA Fall Conference," said Annette Miller, children's librarian at the Tomahawk Public Library. "The La Crosse Public Library was doing a storytime at its local Farmer's Market, and I thought it was a great idea."

In January 2017, Annette presented the idea to the organization who oversees the market in Tomahawk. The Tomahawk Main Street Farmer's Market is held every Tuesday from June through October. It was decided that storytime would be held in early June, before the start of the summer library program. It was an immediate success!

"People who hadn't gone to the market before started to attend for the storytime, and then stayed and shopped at the market," Annette said. "Also, people who didn't visit the library saw that we were at the market and started listening to our stories. Community members were reminded of the library's existence."

Annette said the response was also well received among market vendors. In 2018, the library held a storytime in June, July and August, which were also successful.

This summer, the library will hold a storytime every Tuesday for six weeks, in conjunction with the summer library program.

"In the case of excessive rain or heat, we hold the program in the library," Annette said. "It has been so much fun. If your community has a farmer's market, I highly recommend reaching out and partnering."

Harry Potter Escape Room at MCPL



The Harry Potter books and films have transported millions of people to Hogwarts, Diagon Alley and other locales within the wizarding world. In March, the Marathon County Public Library provided tweens, teens and adults with a multi-sensory, interactive and

magical experience with "Escape from the Deathday Dungeon: A Harry Potter Escape Room Experience."

Over the course of two days during spring break, nearly 80 attendees attempted to escape from the room in 45 minutes or less. The scenario? Deep within the dungeons of Hogwarts, Nearly Headless Nick is hosting a dinner party in honor of his Deathday. While in attendance, you and your group somehow get trapped in the dungeon with no living being around to help let you out. Will you be able to make it out before you perish and become a ghost, too?

MCPL Library Specialist Laura Lawler created the escape room scenario from scratch. She used the WVLS Breakout EDU escape room kit, objects from past programs, items she personally owned or borrowed from friends, and a few newly-purchased materials to furnish the room and make it as enchanting as possible. In addition, she also handmade props with help from members of MCPL's Teen Advisory Group (TAG).

Due to its massive success, "Escape from the Deathday Dungeon: A Harry Potter Escape Room Experience" will again be offered at MCPL Wausau July

The Toy Story crew knows library cards help bring great stories to life. From borrowing books, movies, or museum passes, to enjoying story time or group play, there's no end to the exciting activities you can access with a library card.

A variety of "Toy Story 4" posters, stickers and bookmarks are available now for purchase through the ALA Store at <u>alastore.ala.org</u>.

Next month, free library card artwork as well as other print and digital graphics featuring "Toy Story 4" characters will be available for libraries to use. Sample tools, including a proclamation, press release, radio PSA scripts and social media posts will also be provided.

In "Toy Story 4," coming to theaters nationwide on June 21, Woody has always felt confident about his place in the world and that his priority is taking care of his kid, whether that's Andy or Bonnie. But when Bonnie adds a reluctant new

toy called "Forky" to her room, a road trip adventure alongside old and new friends will show Woody how big the world can be for a toy.

Since 1987, Library Card Sign-up Month has been held each September to mark the beginning of the school year.
