WVLS is partnering with the League of Women Voters of the Northwoods (LWVNOW) to share voter registration tools developed by LWVNOW with all WVLS library locations by September 24, which is <u>National Voter Registration Day.</u> This is a "soft opening" with more training opportunities to come.

LWVNOW has already beta tested the materials at seven WVLS libraries in four counties: Antigo Public Library, Tomahawk Public Library, T.B. Scott Free Library (Merrill), Demmer Memorial Library (Three Lakes), Minocqua Public Library, Rhinelander District Library and Crandon Public Library.
