7) Media Do Books Available to Read Via Libby

Media Do ebooks are now available in Libby. Library users can browse and borrow them alongside the rest of your digital collection directly in the app. Once borrowed, these titles appear on a user's Shelf in Libby but open in Media Do's browser-based ebook reader.

Media Do's browser-based ebook reader is specifically designed to display content with special formatting, like graphic novels and books that read right-to-left. Media Do ebooks require an internet connection and can't be downloaded for offline use. Check out this help article for more information about Media Do ebooks in Libby.
