6) WPLC and Overdrive

- Due to a cooperative purchase by a few WI systems and libraries, magazines have been
 added to Wisconsin's Digital Library for the whole state to enjoy. The collection includes
 over 3,000 titles. All are simultaneous use and can be accessible via the website, the Libby
 and OverDrive apps. The collection can be searched or browsed by clicking on the Collections
 tab at the top of Wisconsin's Digital Library.

7) REALM Project Test 7 and 8 Results Available

The REALM project has published the results of Tests 7 and 8 of Battelle's laboratory testing for infectious COVID-19 virus on materials commonly found in libraries, archives and museums. These tests compare the effect of colder and warmer temperatures on the attenuation rate of the virus on materials previously tested at ambient room temperatures.

8) ALA Accepting Second Round of Grants for Small Libraries

ALA is again accepting applications for **Libraries Transforming Communities (LTC): Focus on Small and Rural Libraries**, a grant initiative that will distribute nearly \$2 million to libraries.

Participating libraries will receive training in how to lead conversations, a skill vital to 21st-century librarianship. Library workers will complete a free ALA e-course on basic facilitation skills; host at least one conversation with community members on a chosen topic; and receive \$3,000 to support community engagement efforts. Grant funds may cover a range of expenses, including staff time and collections and technology purchases.

Up to 450 grants will be awarded in Round 2 of ALA's community engagement funding initiative. <u>Library workers may apply online for grant funding by March 4</u>.
