Give All Your Power Away: Keys to an Organizational Remodel Speakers: Katharine Clark and Jocelyn Sansing, Middleton Public Library

- What two things are you taking away that you heard or do you think are most important?

1. What was the title of a session you attended?

Framework of our Future: Building a Strategic Plan Step by Step presented by Brittany Larson, Director of the Muskego Public Library

• What two things are you taking away that you heard or do you think are most important?

In the absence of a strategic plan, a library mission statement and annual goals can suffice, however a strategic plan will give you data to allocate funds, time, space and other resources in the best possible way. Don't let someone else write about your future. Strategic planning is about looking ahead and planning so that we aren't surprised.

Be wise about building your planning team. Consider what stakeholders have authority, who needs advance notice, and who you most need to have buy-in during the planning process. It is not necessary for the entire staff or entire board to be on the planning team. Consider who among those groups are your champions.

Strategic planning takes time, consider your stakeholders' availability as some may be most available at certain times of year. Strategic planning can take a considerable amount of time. It's okay to extend your current strategic plan temporarily if there is not sufficient time or funds to devote to a strategic plan.

When gathering data via surveys, focus groups, feedback boards, stakeholder interviews, keep the questions/data gathered consistent to be able to compare responses.
