What is YSIE?

- YSIE is youth services information exchange.
- YSIE get-togethers are informal grassroots gatherings of library staff who serve youth.
- These collegial discussions are important to resource- and informationsharing as well as brainstorming, as participants are encouraged to share their own success stories as well as questions and advice.
- Learning from and sharing with our colleagues, whether virtual or inperson, can energize, inspire, and inform all who attend.
- Each get-together, 1-2 featured topics will be shared ahead of time to discuss along with a time for participants to share their own topics.
- YSIE get-togethers will be a mixture of virtual and in-person opportunities.
- In-person YSIE get-togethers will also feature a library tour.

STREAM Sharing and Brainstorming

- S.T.R.E.A.M. Team
 - Offered weekly, during the day
 - o For ages 3-5
 - Very popular so pre-registration is required- this led to the same program being offered 3 times in one day (9:30a, 10:30a, 1:30p)
 - \circ R = reading.
 - There is a short storytime followed by themed activities at several stations.
- School-Age STEAM night
 - o Offered weekly, at night
 - For school-age children
 - o Several tables available, each with a different hands-on activity

- Activities that are more involved (such as Ozobots) will be featured on a table each week for a month; simpler activities will be featured once
- No reading/literacy involved with this program
- Tween STEAM
 - Offered monthly
 - o For ages 8-11
 - Focus on 1 STEAM activity
 - Pre-registration is required
- Kids Science Lab
 - o For ages 5-7
 - No registration required
- Obstacle courses that involved math skills
- Galaxies in a Jar
- Coke and Mentos eruptions compared to Diet Coke and Mentos eruptions
- Program by UW-Madison Entomology- they brought live bugs to share
- Size charts
 - Pick an object (such as snowballs) and build upward on a pole/wallchildren (and caregivers!) and measure themselves. How many snowballs tall are you?

 - o Snack (Goldfish, crackers, fruit snacks)
 - Book
 - Magnifying glasses
 - Handstamps
 - Tattoos
 - Bookmarks
 - Stickers
 - Small wooden toys

 - o Sticker dress-up dolls
 - o Squishy toys
