# 2) Applications Now Open for DPI's Teen Inclusive Internship

Five Wisconsin public libraries will be chosen to participate in an LSTA grant-funded program to offer paid summer 2024 internships to recruit and hire teens that reflect the diversity of their communities. The interns will bring their skills, interests, and experiences to the library by working on a <u>Connected Learning Project</u>. Participating libraries will learn how to further engage and support teens while creating career pathways to increase diversity in the field of librarianship.

#### 4) Trauma Sensitive Schools Spring Webinar

Join DPI and the Wisconsin Safe and Healthy Schools Center for a free <u>Trauma Sensitive Schools</u> <u>webinar</u> on April 9 from 9-11 a.m. The webinar will feature Alex Shevrin Venet, author of Equity-Centered Trauma-Informed Education. The session will explore how trauma and inequity are present in our schools and how teachers can respond despite limited time and resources.

A framework for equity-centered trauma-informed education will be introduced along with its guiding principles to help educators assist students who have been impacted by trauma. It will cover proactive priorities for transforming the school environment and ways to tap into larger efforts for change.
