Understanding Addiction: A Conversation with Dr. Nicholaus Christian

Dr. Nicholaus Christian is an internal medicine and addiction medicine clinician and researcher for the Office of Clinical Director for the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) Intramural Research Program. Dr. Christian completed his addiction medicine fellowship at the Yale Program in Addiction Medicine as well as postdoctoral research training through the Veterans Affairs Health Services Research and Development program. His current clinical and research interests include improving care for people who use substances that are on the continuum of experiencing homelessness to being stably housed.

7) Flexible Facilities Program

The State of Wisconsin Department of Administration has been awarded \$107 million for the Flexible Facilities Program to provide grants to units of general local government (UGLGs) and tribal governments for the purpose of carrying out critical capital projects directly enabling work, education, and health monitoring in response to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic public health emergency.

Funding is available for the construction of new or renovation or expansion of existing libraries, community centers, and multi- purpose community facilities that will offer reliable, affordable high speed internet and other digital connectivity technology that will directly enable work, education, and healthcare monitoring, including remote options. The program encourages focusing on economically distressed areas, supporting community empowerment, and adopting strong labor practices.

There is a requirement for applicants to certify that the proposed site has or will have Broadband

download speeds of 100 Mbps to qualify. DPI is working with library systems that maintain TEACH connections to work through this requirement. Application Training will be held May 9 and applications are due no later than 2 p.m. on Thursday, July 11.
