

1) Library Legislative Day Scholarships

<u>Register</u> this week for WLA Library Legislative Day in Madison on Tuesday, February 11. This is a state budget producing year, and WVLS would like to have at least two representatives from each county participating. Newcomers are welcome. The registration deadline is Friday, January 10.

WVLS is offering \$400 scholarships to member library staff and trustees to attend. It covers registration (\$45), one night of lodging, mileage to and from WVLS, and three meal reimbursements. <u>Download the scholarship application from the WVLS website.</u>

WVLS is awarding scholarships to member library staff to attend the IUG (Innovative User Group) 2025 Conference in Denver, Colorado on March 13-15.

Offered annually, the IUG Conference consists of three general conference days, with dozens of sessions ranging from general interest to specialized topics. Gregory Lester, Ph.D., is a clinical, consulting, and research psychologist with practices in Colorado and Texas. Dr. Lester has presented over 2,000 personality disorders trainings to over 200,000 professionals. Dr. Lester has served on the graduate faculty of The University of St. Thomas, and is the author of nine

books, including Management of Personality Disorders, which is the largest-selling front-line clinical manual on diagnosing, treating, and managing personality disorders.
